Luke 1: 26-33 (First Nation's Version) When six moons had passed, the Great Spirit sent the same spirit-messenger, Creator's Mighty One (Gabriel), to another small, out-of-the-way place in the hill country called Seed Planter Village (Nazareth). There he appeared to a young virgin woman named Bitter Tears (Mary), who was promised in marriage to a man named He Gives Sons (Joseph), a descendant of the great chief Much Loved One (David). Creator's Mighty One (Gabriel) said to her, "Greetings, highly favored one! You are close to the Great Spirit and greatly honored among women." Bitter Tears (Mary) was deeply troubled by this greeting and wondered what the spirit-messenger would say. "Do not fear," he comforted her, "for you have found goodwill in the eyes of the Great Mystery. You will be with child and give birth to a son. You will name him Creator Sets Free (Jesus)." It seemed like time stood still, and all creation stopped to listen as the messenger continued to speak. "He will be greatly honored, the Son of the One Above Us All. He will be a great chief like his ancestor Much Loved One (David) and will sit in his seat of honor. He will always be chief over the tribes of Wrestles with Creator (Israel). His chiefly guidance will never end."

The season of Advent is here and Christmas is on the way. It's a time for stories. Today, let's live in awe of all the stories you know. Stories are all part of the miracle of human existence. Every culture has them; they abound throughout the world. Everybody has at least one story to tell and most of us have many. We come to know ourselves and others through stories. Before civilization, before science, before recognizable cultures, there were stories. Shakespeare had Hamlet say, "the play's the

thing," and he used that story to ensnare the conscience of the king.

The history of faith is filled with stories about the way God has interacted with people over the centuries of time. The word Gospel means God's story. Jesus used stories to catch our thoughts in a web of consciousness about life and life's values. In fact, we may accurately speak about the entire Bible as a collection of the stories of the interactions between God, creation and humankind.

Modern cultural critics remind us that ours is an entertainment age, and nothing entertains us better than stories. One of the many interesting things about electronic culture is the renewed emphasis it has placed on narrative, on the gathering of events and memories into stories. Think of the millions of stories being published or dramatized on TV and in the movies every year...all wonderful creations of the human mind's experiences.

Remember your own stories today. All stories are mostly autobiography. Remember the stories of your loved ones. Remember the faces of those who are not in the stories your life is writing now; give thanks for them. They've helped make you who you are. Celebrate the new friends and loved ones who have entered your life. They will enliven the stories you tell tomorrow. Laugh a little, cry a little...and give thanks for the abundance of stories.

Blessing Box Reminders

When outside temperatures begin to freeze, please do not place items like glass bottled drinks, carbonated beverages, and any liquids in thin plastic containers into the Blessing Box, as they can freeze and potentially burst or become unusable in cold weather.

Key points to remember:

Glass containers: These are prone to breaking when frozen.
Canned drinks with high carbonation: The pressure from freezing can cause the cans to explode.

Thin plastic containers: These can crack or break when exposed to extreme cold.



Instead, focus on donating items such as: canned goods with pull tabs, individually packaged snacks, dry goods like pasta and rice, warm clothing items like hats and gloves, and hygiene products with sturdy packaging.
