The Prophetic Nature of Soren Kierkegaard

Soren Aabye Kierkegaard (1813-1855) was one of the most interesting figures of the 19th century. Born in a strict Danish Lutheran home that left a deep imprint on him, Kierkegaard had an unhappy youth. His frail and slightly twisted frame (scoliosis) made him the object of mockery throughout his entire life. In time, he became convinced that his undeniable intellectual gifts meant that he was called to a special mission, and before that every other interest must give way. With that thought in mind, he broke off his engagement with a woman he deeply loved. Marriage, he said, would have made him happier, but would also have prevented him from being the solitary knight of faith he was called to be. Years later he compared his painful decision to not marry to that of Abraham's willingness to sacrifice Isaac; he also declared that some of his books were written "because of her" (*Either / Or*.)

For Kierkegaard (and for me, too) the greatest enemy of Christianity is Christendom itself, whose purpose is to simplify the matter of becoming a Christian. This usually translates into: if a person is not a Jew, Moslem or Hindu, then by default the person must be Christian. Kierkegaard called those who thought of Christianity in this fashion as mere pagans. Such cheap Christianity, with neither cost nor suffering nor pain, a life where there is no real risk, is just playing at being a Christian. Preachers and church communities play at that game every time we seek to make Christianity an easy thing. "This is the crime of Christendom," which plays at Christianity and "takes God for a fool." And the real tragedy is how few realize they're doing it and how ridiculous it is to speak of God is such terms.

In response to the tragedy of Christendom, Kierkegaard conceived his calling as *making Christianity difficult*. This didn't mean that he was to persuade people that Christian faith was wrong. Rather, it meant that he must tell them what they had usually heard preached and taught was far from the true faith of Christianity. In other words, in order to be truly Christian, one must become aware of the


cost of faith and pay the price. Without that, one may well be a member of Christendom, but not a Christian.

True Christianity has to do with a person's very existence, their character, and not merely with intellectual assent to certain beliefs. Human existence is a constant struggle, a struggle to become, to be born anew in one's own time and place. In placing existence at the heart of matters, a person is forced to abandon all the other gods the world produces to claim your allegiance. Kierkegaard was interested in a particular form of existence: Christian existence. It cannot be reduced to a system or some "ism." The tragedy of Christendom, of easy Christianity, is that existence ceases to be an adventure and a constant risk in the presence of God, and becomes merely a prescribed morality or a doctrinal system popular within one's own culture. So, for Soren Kierkegaard, and for you and me, the greatest problem is how do we become a true Christian when we are born into and have the disadvantage of living in the midst of our nation's brand of Christendom? Together, we'll figure this out.

New Local Mission Opportunity

Housing - Healing - Hope: Liberation Veteran Services has been supporting homeless veterans with dignity and respect in the greater Richmond area. With a current program capacity of 38, they serve veterans ages 25 to 77, with 86% success rate of transition to permanent housing!

It is very exciting that they recently received a grant for a supportive housing facility, Veteran Village, which will consist of micro apartments.

Although they always need clothing and bedding, their greatest need right now is for the following: toilet paper, paper towels, bleach, Pine-Sol, antibacterial wipes, laundry and dish detergent, and 55-gallon trash bags. We will be collecting these items through **Sunday**, **November 10**, and will deliver them on or near Veterans Day.

Three Libraries

Did you know we have THREE libraries at HUMC? The "Main Library" is on the left in the preschool wing. Both adult and children's books are arranged according to the Dewey Decimal system and includes numerous Bible and faith resources, and both fiction and nonfiction suitable to both children and adults. The check-out box is located on the cabinet on the non-window side/long side of the room.

The "Branch Library" is a nook in the wall directly across the aisle from the sanctuary entrance. It holds a rotating collection of adult/children titles from the Main Library and Mobile Library (see below). To borrow, legibly complete the name and date on the library card, and place the library card in the check-out box on the bottom shelf of the "nook."

The "Mobile Library," also called the "United Women in Faith (UWF) Library," resides in a supply room adjacent to the Fellowship Hall and is brought out for UWF meetings and other events, such as Wednesday Night dinners. The check-out box is located on the cart. Some books available in the "Branch Library" are those that have been moved from the "Mobile Library" and are part of the permanent "Main Library."

Peruse, and borrow, books from any of the three. To borrow a book, legibly complete the name and date on the library card found at the back of the book and place it in the check-out box. Beginning this month blurbs about some books in the Branch Library occasionally will appear in the *Pulse*. (See the following!)
