Radio


Reminisce with me a little today about the power of radio and its place in God's world. You and I take radio for granted and listen to it in our cars as we commute to work, run errands or venture out on a road trip. We don't have a radio in our cars anymore - we have an audio sound system: Bose, JBL, Sony etc. We can turn those babies up so loud people in the cars behind and beside us can listen even with the windows up and the AC on. Boom Baboom - Boom Baboom. All this bears little resemblance to the radio I remember as a child. First, there was no instant ON...the vacuum tubes took a bit of warming up. Radio was fantastic, magical. It brought the world to our doorsteps, brought a world of laughter, romance, adventure and thrills. We kids would sneak small transistor radios into elementary school in the fall to listen to the World Series – and then rush home after school, warm up the radio and catch the rest of the game. As a kid I would hear radio broadcasts like: Lum & Abner, Gun Smoke, The Shadow, Burns and Allen, Jack Benny, The Great Gildersleeve, War of the Worlds. You can still hear many of these shows on the Big Broadcast every Sunday night at 7 p.m. on WAMU 88.5 FM. Here's what made radio so great – the stage the actors strode upon was the creative imagination of everyone listening. People heard all the great events of history – Edward VIII's abdication, the announcement that the Japanese had bombed Pearl Harbor, FDR's and Churchill's speeches. Every night I would go to bed and eventually find sleep while listening to some program on the radio. Because of a wonderful little quality of AM radio called *skip*, as a child growing up in Charlottesville,

I could listen to WBZ in Boston or WOWO in Fort Wayne...and imagine the exciting things going on in those far away cities. What excitement. What fun. To this day I usually fall asleep at night listening to NPR and the BBC. I put my Skullcandy earplugs in every morning at 5 a.m. and awaken to the first sounds of what's going on in the world. Sometime in the 1950s a popular pastor, Charles Wellborn, preached a sermon called *God Speaking*, in which he presented God as speaking directly to the listening audience. I wonder if God still doesn't speak to us through the music, news and joy of simply *hearing* about what's new in the world - this day the Lord has made!

New Local Mission Opportunity

Housing - Healing - Hope: Liberation Veteran Services has been supporting homeless veterans with dignity and respect in the greater Richmond, Virginia area. With a current program capacity of 38, they serve veterans ages 25 to 77, with 86% success rate of transition to permanent housing!

It is very exciting that they recently received a grant for a supportive housing facility, Veteran Village, which will consist of micro apartments.

Although they always need clothing and bedding, their greatest need right now is for the following: toilet paper, paper towels, bleach, Pine-Sol, antibacterial wipes, laundry and dish detergent, and 55-gallon trash bags. We will be collecting these items starting Sunday, October 13, through Sunday, November 10, and will deliver them on or near Veterans Day.

HUMC Libraries

Did you know we have THREE libraries at HUMC? The "Main Library" is on the left in the preschool wing. Both adult and children's books are arranged according to the Dewey Decimal system and includes numerous Bible and faith resources, and both fiction and nonfiction suitable to both children and adults. The check-out box is located on the cabinet on the non-window side/long side of the room.

The "Branch Library" is a nook in the wall directly across the aisle from the sanctuary entrance. It holds a rotating collection of adult/children titles from the Main Library and Mobile Library (see below). To borrow, legibly complete the name and date on the library card, and place the library card in the check-out box on the bottom shelf of the "nook.".

The "Mobile Library," also called the "United Women in Faith (UWF) Library," resides in a supply room adjacent to the Fellowship Hall and is brought out for UWF meetings and other events, such as Wednesday Night dinners. The check-out box is located on the cart. Some books available in the "Branch Library" are those that have been moved from the "Mobile Library" and are part of the permanent "Main Library."

Peruse, and borrow, books from any of the three. To borrow a book, legibly complete the name and date on the library card found at the back of the book and place it in the check-out box. Beginning in October blurbs about some books in the Branch Library occasionally will appear in the *Pulse*. (See below!)
