Every Wednesday I host a Chapel Time with the children of our Preschool. What impressed me was how unselfconscious the children are. If someone goofs up on trying to say something, they all just laugh it off. It seems to increase the fun. They just enjoy being human and part of our time together. They simply want to be who they are and drink in the moment. They know me as Pastor Jim.


It's funny how that may change for them as they age. At what age do we begin spending time wanting to be something other than what we genuinely are? When did we give up on discovering who we are and enjoying that? All the great saints have been deeply aware of who they are and their humanity, deeply aware that they're flesh and blood and it is only God's grace that permits them to transcend their limitations and inherit Kingdom life.

Some of us don't appreciate people who appear to be unreflective, just living life, watching the tide roll in. Perhaps these folks are able to hold on to a bit of their childhoods, engaged in being fully human and not so selfconscious about everything. Poet Nikos Kazantzakis reflected that his earliest memories were of earth, sea, his mother, and star-studded skies; all his life he experienced these four elements 'with exactly the same ardor" as in his childhood. Imagine the gift of being human and feeling such things for a lifetime. Right you are Nikos: we are all mortal and imperfect. But what a joy-filled imperfection it is. And how unspeakably beautiful it is to be human, to learn and grow and fall in love. How beautiful to occasionally miss a line in the song or be out of step with the beat of life and the cosmic dance.

Housing - Healing - Hope: Liberation Veteran Services has been supporting homeless veterans with dignity and respect in the greater Richmond area. With a current program capacity of 38, they serve veterans ages 25 to 77, with 86% success rate of transition to permanent housing!

It is very exciting that they recently received a grant for a supportive housing facility, Veteran Village, which will consist of micro apartments.

Although they always need clothing and bedding, their greatest need right now is for the following: toilet paper, paper towels, bleach, Pine-Sol, antibacterial wipes, laundry and dish detergent, and 55-gallon trash bags. We will be collecting these items through **Sunday**, **November 10**, and will deliver them on or near Veterans Day.

Joy of Crafts

HUMC Libraries

Did you know we have THREE libraries at HUMC? The "Main Library" is on the left in the preschool wing. Both adult and children's books are arranged according to the Dewey Decimal system and includes numerous Bible and faith resources, and both fiction and nonfiction suitable to both children and adults. The check-out box is located on the cabinet on the nonwindow side/long side of the room.

The "Branch Library" is a nook in the wall directly across the aisle from the sanctuary entrance. It holds a rotating collection of adult/children titles from the Main Library and Mobile Library (see below). To borrow, legibly complete the name and date on the library card, and place the library card in the check-out box on the bottom shelf of the "nook.".

The "Mobile Library," also called the "United Women in Faith (UWF) Library," resides in a supply room adjacent to the Fellowship Hall and is brought out for UWF meetings and other events, such as Wednesday Night dinners. The check-out box is located on the cart. Some books available in the "Branch Library" are those that have been moved from the "Mobile Library" and are part of the permanent "Main Library."

Peruse, and borrow, books from any of the three. To borrow a book, legibly complete the name and date on the library card found at the back of the book and place it in the check-out box. Beginning in October blurbs about some books in the Branch Library occasionally will appear in the *Pulse*. (See below!)
